Directions from Ottawa: Take the Queensway to Hwy 416. Travel south and take exit 34 to Kemptville. Go west on Cty Rd. 43, past the traffic circles, the Kemptville Mall and Kemptville Building Supply. Turn left on Somerville Road. Go to the next stop sign and turn right onto Cty Rd 18. Travel 2.2 km to Dennison Road. Turn left on Dennison Road. Cross over the river and railroad tracks to the stop sign at the next concession road, Bedell St. Turn left - it is the second driveway on the right. It is well marked. Go up the driveway and park on the left.

Car Pooling: Note to our diplomatic members: If you would like transportation to this event, please contact Marianne Feaver, 613-748-7528. She will be happy to arrange a drive for you with one of the members.

Flower Arranging Competition: When you arrive, tour the gardens and pick the plant material for your contest entries. You may enter an arrangement in one category or in all three of them. Bring containers with you and any other items you will need such as oasis, scissors, ribbon etc. but all plant material must be cut from the Evergreen Farm gardens.

Categories this year:

Kelly will advise where to purchase and obtain more information on daylilies.

When she retired 14 years ago she took correspondence courses from the University of Guelph, earning a Horticulturist Certificate and then joined the Master Gardeners of Ottawa-Carleton. 

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

After five years of work in the Perley Rideau Veterans' Health Centre, planting and maintaining the south courtyard in the Rideau wing, the gardening team celebrated on May 14 by unveiling a brass plaque acknowledging the Garden club's dedication to the garden.

Garden club executive members, patients and family members, staff and the committee members enjoyed tea and goodies baked with products from the garden. A glorious display of giant tulips, courtesy Peter Knippel, provided brilliant colour.

This event highlighted the mutual collaboration and support of the Perley patients and staff, and the volunteer gardeners.

Over the summer we have a team of eleven club members who appear in rotation, garden gloves and spades in hand, to plant, weed, mulch, dead head, nourish and water the garden. This year the team

includes Dianne Breton, Heather Brown, Nancy Colton, Diane Henning, Joan Hoffman, Sally Hutchison, Patricia Padmos, Joan Sirrs, Cathy Stapleton and Mary Udd.

We have a new addition to the courtyard - a large portion of the former garden space has become a covered patio which allows patients safe and comfortable access to the garden. Barbara Brown, the garden therapist and our Perley staff contact person, is now able to expand her creative garden activities for the patients outdoors. For example, an excursion to the market gave patients the opportunity to choose annuals for the large pots placed around the patio. They help with planting and watering their pots, and often extend their hoses to spray the beds we maintain.

A longer term project will be to commence work on the two side gardens which are currently filled with various ground-covers and odds and ends from the central beds. The challenge here is to control the shoots from a row of trees along both

sides. The trees are to be removed at some point by the Perley maintenance crew so we will have a new canvas on which to create interesting compositions.

OUR 2011-2012 AGM

On a sunny day in May, a large and enthusiastic crowd gathered at the Rockcliffe Community Centre for the Ottawa Garden Club's Annual General Meeting. President Victoria Hutton opened the meeting by welcoming everyone and offered a special welcome to Diplomatic Members, as well as to invited guests.

After thanking Mary Mahoney for bringing gift boutique items and Joan Sirrs and her team for the lovely treats on the hospitality table, Victoria opened the business part of the meeting.

First item on the agenda was the membership report. As of May 14, 2012, the number of active members in the Club stands at 139: 17 Diplomatic Members, 5 Consultants, 105 Members and 12 Associate Members. Victoria was sorry to report that two Associate Members have died in the past month: Mrs. Christina McDougall and Mrs. Helen Venables, who was a Past President. She also noted that Mi-Sook Um, wife of the Ambassador to Korea, has returned to her homeland.

Next was the presentation of the floral centrepiece to Nancy Frank who recently lost both her mother-in-law Joan Frank and her mother Joan Keyes. Vice-President Cindy Boucher had created a stunning and artful arrangement which included many items gathered from the forest floor: pine cones, lily of the valley, birch bark, and even a bird's nest. Cindy explained that the woodland theme was especially created for Nancy who lives at Meech Lake, in the Gatineau Park.

Highlight of every AGM is the return of the foster plants. Last fall, six lucky members were selected as foster parents: Kelly Noel, Marion Chappell, Cindy Boucher, Mi-Sook Um, Virginia Theoret and Wendy Dion. Each was given a very small cutting of Streptocarpus 'Jeanette' to nurture

Those attending the AGM eagerly anticipated the results of these efforts, but instead heard stories of droughts and drownings, mishaps and neglect. However, standing proud among several rather pathetic pots of fostered greenery was one glorious specimen in full bloom. Virginia Theoret was the clear winner and voted the most successful foster parent this

year. (Another plant in full bloom also appeared on the table, which stunned the crowd, until it was explained that Anneke Schwarz was not a foster parent but had been growing this plant for years.)


A number of committee chairs made reports to the meeting. Treasurer Kelly Noel presented her summary of the Club's financial activity for the year noting that, as planned, OGC spent more money than we took in this year and last in order to properly celebrate our 50th Anniversary. The total spent on anniversary activities over two years was \$4521.13. Nevertheless, the bank balance at the end of this fiscal year (April 30, 2012) is a healthy \$6,497.

The Program Committee reported on a very successful year with interesting and varied monthly meeting topics and several special outings and activities. Victoria Hutton offered a special thank you to Charlotte Ward, who is stepping down after three years as Program Committee Co-Chair, for her sustained and significant contribution to the Club. Pauline Yelle presented Charlotte with a lovely patio planter and thanked her for her efforts and dedication on behalf of all members who have enjoyed a rich and varied program. Victoria then announced two new executive positions: Christine Edwards as the new Co-Chair of the Program committee and new member Pamela Armstrong as the Membership Secretary, and welcomed their considerable talents and energy to the executive team.

(Several other reports at the meeting, including Outreach Chair Mary Hardwick's report of the work at the Perley Rideau Veterans' Health Centre, Victoria's report on the slate of executive members and new mem-

bers, and information on the Art Show are all featured as separate items in this newsletter.)

Last, but certainly not least, was a presentation by OGC consultant Marilyn Light on How to Rebloom Your Orchid. Marilyn has raised thousands of orchids and has registered more than 20 orchid hybrids, two of which have received awards from the American Society and one of which appeared on a Canadian stamp. Marilyn says that passing on the knowledge she has gained through her caring for orchids is a lifetime passion and she mesmerized the audience with her careful instructions on how to select, care for, and create a period of dormancy for orchids to rebloom. She dispelled many myths as well, such as the popular idea of watering orchids with ice cubes. She said this is not a good idea! At the end of her very interesting and educational presentation, two of the orchids she brought to the meeting were auctioned off, amid much laughter and applause.

There was a mad rush to hang the show on the evening of May 31, and on June 1, 2012 the show entitled "Blossoming" was launched. The subject of their artwork was related to nature or gardening and included a full range of landscapes and intimate garden close-ups. There was a wide variety of artistic media represented including oil, acrylic, encaustic, watercolour, soft pastels, oil pastels, charcoal and photography. It was a thrill for those participating to learn that so many members are

AN ONTARIO GARDEN DAY

With a high of 37° degrees predicted for the day, the anxious organizers of the Garden Club's summer outing could be forgiven for wondering how many participants might sensibly decide that this was an activity best left to mad dogs and Englishmen! However, our garden enthusiasts were not so easily deterred, arriving bright and early appropriately attired in cool cottons and linens and sporting an array of jaunty sunhats. The conversation was lively as we set off in our blessedly air-conditioned coach.

After a brief stop in Kemptville to pick up some more members of the group, we headed south to Oakleaf Gardens near Athens. It is the remarkable creation of two retired McMaster history professors, Dr. Paul Fritz (modern British history) and his partner Dr. David Russo (American history). They have in common an intense love of gardening, and this was immediately evident as we approached the beautifully restored 1829 stone house and caught our first glimpses of the gardens - the results of 25 years

of creativity and hard work. Paul talked to us about the heritage roses for which the garden is famous and showed us some of his particular favourites such as 'Rosa Mundi', the old red Lancaster Rose, and the white Jacobite rose 'Alba Plena'. The Gallica 'Cardinal Richelieu', a gorgeous dark mauve, is also a favourite, as is 'Madame Hardy', a white damask rose with a green eye, and 'Harison's Yellow' - the Yellow Rose of Texas.

> Starting our guided tour in the shade garden, we were introduced to a small statue of St. Fiacre, an Irish divine who is the patron saint of gardening and taxi drivers. Next was the Mediterranean garden, planted with a vivid display of blue ornamental sage surrounded by silver Artemisia, after which we moved into the intriguing and beautiful Rose Garden, each labelled specimen given plenty of room to flourish. Passing through one of the low drystone walls that surround and protect the different garden areas, we found a lush vegetable garden, and on the other side of the house a 36m long, 6m wide perennial border planted with 31 varieties of peony, as well as daylilies and Cannas. Further down the property, near a peaceful pond, is a Celtic stone garden featuring a natural stone "floor" planted with vivid yellow Sedums,

and a carefully placed arrangement of large sculptural rocks. There were so many wonders to explore in this garden that we could have stayed all day, but of course the time inevitably came for us to move on.

On our way to an excellent lunch at the Stagecoach Inn in Newboro, and a shopping opportunity at the legendary department store Kilborns, we made another short stop at a delightful small gift shop called The Green Gecko in Philipsville. Never mind geckos – we were more like locusts descending on this tiny place – but the poor unsuspecting owner rallied bravely and was probably able to shut up shop for the rest of the day!

After lunch we wound our way along pretty country roads to our next destination, Larry and Peggy Fry's house and garden in Elgin. Their immaculately restored home, built in the 1860's by early Irish settlers is recognized as an Historic Place by the Township of Bastard and South Burgess. It is set on a slight rise back from the road and features an elegantly symmetrical façade with a spacious trellised verandah. Larry and Peggy have created a garden that more than complements this beautiful house, with a broad sweep of lawn in front surrounded by perennial beds under large trees, and a more complex arrangement of borders and beds in another section of the garden. Rather than the traditional mix of perennials, these beds have been designed to showcase groupings of different varieties of one type of plant; the Echinacea bed features varieties such as 'Green Envy', 'Pink Poodle', 'Tomato Soup', 'Sunrise' and 'Sunset'. Other groupings include many different kinds of Rudbeckia, Gallardia, Phlox, peonies and lilies this last with not a lily beetle in sight – apparently Larry picks them all off by hand every day! Well into his 80's, Larry now has the help of a professional landscaper, but still spends many hours each day tending his garden with dedicated care, come rain or 40 degree humidex. Unlike hardy Larry however, some of us were beginning
